But in the last couple of years, the ten-year lifespan of those last coats of paint began to fade.

# MAYOR'S MEMO

Happy Holidays! There have not been too many opportunities in my almost 20 years as your Mayor that I have had the opportunity to formally send you these wishes. And, as you have probably read from the beginning article in this newsletter, there's been a change in how we communicate with you that has made this possible.

Every member of the Wytheville Town Council, town administration and staff works each day on behalf of you, the citizens of Wytheville. There are hundreds of daily tasks that must be performed to keep a variety of services and programs running smoothly throughout our town. Sometimes these result in changes that we need to communicate with you. You need to be informed. We hope that the new publication schedule of this newsletter will help do that in a more timely and accurate way.

We are continuing to keep a watch on the state's budget and how cuts in state funding will impact the services we provide. This is making us even more mindful of making sure that every tax dollar counts and that we spend them wisely. Recently several of our departments have submitted applications or been awarded grant funding for different initiatives; this will further enhance what a "Wytheville dollar" can accomplish.

While many localities throughout the state have increased their local taxes, we have once again held the line and not increased taxes this year. We will continue to look for ways to keep our expenses in line with revenues as we ride out the current economic storm. One way to do that is through cooperative efforts. One such project has been our work with Wythe County in the development of the Regional Water Authority. This is allowing us

to tap the resources of the New River and further produce clean, safe water for today and tomorrow. We are currently exploring, also with Wythe County, the possibility of a combined 911 communication center that could potentially save money for both local governments and provide more efficient services.

Make sure you are counted in 2010! It is once again time for a national census and it is very important that the residents of Wytheville are accurately counted. Many sources of funding are tied to population. So make yourself count! We will provide further information about this as it becomes available.

It's hard for the mind to grasp that we are approaching the second decade in the 21st century. Looking over the past ten years for our local community and our nation, there have certainly been many changes. So, as we are in the midst of this holiday season, it is an appropriate time to reflect on these and remain thankful that we still live in a nation that is built on freedom and that our town is still a growing and vibrant part of Southwest Virginia. On behalf of the Wytheville Town Council, I wish you and your family a Merry Christmas and a blessed holiday season and hope that 2010 will begin another positive decade for our community.

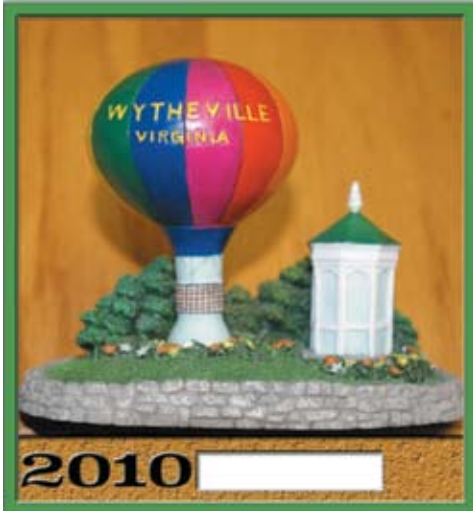

### **WYTHEVILLE LANDMARK GETS A NEW COAT, Continued from front page:**

Earlier this year, the Wytheville Town Council approved for work to begin to refurbish the tank. While most work was for the exterior of the tank, some interior repairs needed to be done in areas where the paint had failed. A cathodic protection system was also installed to prevent corrosion and metal loss in the interior of the tank. The project began in late August and was done by the contracting firm of J&W of North Carolina, Inc., and the engineering firm of Tank Industry Consultants, at a cost of just over \$200,000. Over 60 gallons of paint were used to make the multicolored layers. The project was completed in the beginning of October.

## Vehicle Decals On Sale

It's time to purchase your 2010 Town of Wytheville vehicle decals. Beginning March 1, decals will be available for automobiles and motorcycles at the Wytheville Municipal Building on Monroe Street. All personal property and mobile home taxes for the Town of Wytheville and Wythe County must be paid before a decal will be issued. Automobile decals cost \$20.00; motorcycle decals are \$6.00. Your Social Security number and vehicle registration will be required when purchasing the decal. All decals must be purchased and displayed by April 15, 2010, to avoid violation.

## Cat Licenses on Sale in February

The Town of Wytheville reminds cat owners that cat licenses will be on sale during the month of February. The fee for a license is \$4.00 for each neutered cat and \$6.00 for each non-neutered cat and must be purchased annually for each cat. Licenses will be on sale February 1-28 at the Wytheville Municipal Building. All cats, within the town limits, over four months of age must be vaccinated against rabies. Owners will need to present the cat's vaccination certificate before a cat license can be issued. Please note that it is unlawful to allow non-licensed cats to roam outside, and that these cats may be apprehended by the animal warden or a police officer.

## Purchasing a Business License

The Treasurer's Office will mail applications around January 20. The application and fee for the license is due by March 1st. Anyone doing business in the Town of Wytheville is required to purchase a license.

## Treasurer's Office Credit Card Payments

For the convenience of their customers, the Treasurer's Office accepts Master Card and Visa credit cards, in person. Customers can use their credit card to pay for any bills due to the Treasurer's Office – water, sewer, taxes and licenses.
